

# Immigration Detention and Community Statistics Summary

## 31 January 2015



### About this report

This report provides an overview of the number of people in immigration detention and Offshore Processing Centres as at midnight on the date of the report. The report is produced on a monthly basis.

Data is sourced from several departmental processing and recording systems. Data relating to the immigration detention population is dynamic and there can be delays in transmission of information from the department's immigration detention network operations. Variations in figures between this report and previous issues can occur. Due to these issues, data from the current financial year should always be considered provisional.

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### Immigration Detention and Community Statistics Summary

As at 31 January 2015, there were 2298 people in immigration detention facilities, including 1974 in immigration detention on the mainland and 324 in immigration detention on Christmas Island.

A further 3014 people were living in the community after being approved for a residence determination and 26168 were living in the community having been granted a Bridging Visa E.

## Community Population by State/Territory

Of the 3014 people approved for a residence determination to live in the community, 39.4% are in Victoria, 22.7% in Queensland, 16.6% in New South Wales, 9.1% in Western Australia, 8.7% in South Australia, 1.8% in the Australian Capital Territory and 1.6% in Tasmania.



The number of people in immigration detention continues to fluctuate month to month, as a result of releases into the community.


### Figure 1 - Population in Immigration Detention



## People in Immigration Detention Facilities by Arrival Type

The number of people in immigration detention facilities, who arrived unlawfully by air or boat as at 31 January 2015 was 1695, representing approximately 74% of the total immigration detention population.

There were also 603 people (about 26% of the total immigration population) who arrived in Australia lawfully and were subsequently taken into immigration detention and had visa cancellations for either over staying or breaching their visa conditions.

## People in Immigration Detention by Nationality

As at 31 January 2015, there were 2298 people in held immigration detention facilities. Of these 2298 people, around 26.8% were from Iran, 8.1% were from Sri Lanka, 7.6% were Stateless, 6.5% were from China and 6.3% were from Vietnam.

### Table 3 - People in Immigration Detention Facilities as at 31 January 2015

As at 31 January 2015, 3014 were people living in the community after being approved for a residence determination. Of these 3014 people, around 29.6% were from Iran, 23.5% were from Sri Lanka, 14.0% were Stateless and 7.7% were from Vietnam.



## Children in Immigration Detention


As at 31 January 2015, there were 211 children (aged under 18 years) in Immigration Residential Housing, Immigration Transit Accommodation and Alternative Places of Detention.

The number of children in immigration facilities decreased in January due to children completing mandatory processing and being transferred into the community.

The number of children living in the community after being approved for a residence determination slightly decreased in January 2015 to 1551 children.

## Time in Immigration Detention Facilities


As at 31 January 2015, there were 2298 people in immigration detention facilities. Of these 2298 people, around 18.1% had been detained for 3 months or less and 39.9% had been detained for 12 months or less.

The average period of time for people held in detention facilities has slightly increased from last month to 442 days as at 31 January 2015.

## Time in Community Detention

Of the 3014 people in Community Detention, as at 31 January 2015, 3.2% had been detained under 3 months and 32.5% had been detained for 12 months or less. This includes the period detained in facilities prior to transferring to Community Detention.
